A Word from The Incoming Student Representative to Board of Directors

A specific charge in the SANMS student report to the ACNM Board of Directors was to increase student involvement in ACNM. I, along with other members of the board, am working on communicating this desire to the sections, committees, and taskforces. It is important to note as we work to increase student involvement that we recognize that students are playing a key role. Many affiliates already include students in a specific role within their leadership or in the affiliate. The board of directors included a student representative. This position rotates alphabetically throughout the midwifery education programs. Dede Horvath, SNM has served for the last year as the student representative ending her term at the last annual meeting. Students are serving with the PAC, and many were volunteered at the PAC rally in Albuquerque. Students also served as pages at the annual meeting. I would like to highlight a student from Johns Hopkins/Shenandoah University, Zoe Gutterman, SNM who presented information to the Board of Directors regarding gynecological and primary care of incarcerated women, and requested a position statement. The board voted to send this request to the Division of Standards and Practice (DOSP). This would not have been done without this student.

To increase your involvement there are many things that you can do. The first is to connect with your local affiliate. Seek ways in which you can become involved. This does not mean to wait for someone to advertise they want student help. The students I have met that have had the most success in becoming involved saw a need for their help and offered it instead of waiting to be asked to help.

ACNM is your professional organization. Getting involved now helps you build connections to finding a job upon graduation, finding midwives that mentor you as you transition to the role of new midwife, and can help prepare you to be involved. Being a student is stressful and challenging, and your student role should be your priority, but there is much to do in ACNM.
